Agreeing & Disagreeing

Agreement

- I completely / absolutely agree with you.
- There's no doubt that...
- I couldn't agree more.
- I completely agree.
- That's so true.
- Absolutely. / Exactly. / Of course.
- You're absolutely right.
- Yes, I agree.
- I think so too.
- That's a good point.
- I don't think so either.
- So do I.
- I'd go along with that.
- That's true.
- Neither do I.
- I agree with you entirely.
- That's just what I was thinking.
- I couldn't agree more.

Partial agreement

- I agree up to a point, but...
- That's true, but...
- You could be right.
- It sounds interesting, bit...
- I see your point, but...
- That's partly true, but...
- I'm not sure about that.
- It is only partly true that...
- I can agree with that only with reservations.
- That seems obvious, but...
- That's not necessarily so.
- It is not as simple as it seems.
- I agree with you in principle, but...
- I agree with you in part, but...
- Well, you could be right.
- That might be true; however...

Disagreement

- I cannot share this / that / the view.
- I totally disagree.
- No way!
- I'm afraid I can't agree with you.
- To be honest...
- On the contrary.
- It's out of the question.
- That's different.
- I don't agree with you.
- However...
- That's not entirely true.
- I'm sorry to disagree, but...
- Yes, but don't you think...?
- That's not the same thing at all.
- I'm afraid I have to disagree.
- I'm not sure about that.
- I must take issue with you on that.
- It's unjustifiable to say that...
- What I object to is...

Agreeing & disagreeing: So do I / Neither do I, etc.

- To agree with a positive statement:
 - We use *so + auxiliary/modal verb + pronoun / Me too*:
 - 'I like tea with sugar'
 - 'So do I.' or 'Me too.'
- To agree with a negative statement:
 - We use *nor/neither + auxiliary/modal verb + pronoun / Me neither*:
 - 'I don't like tea with sugar.'
 - 'Nor/Neither do I.' or 'Me neither'
- To disagree with a positive statement:
 - We use *pronoun + auxiliary/modal verb + not*:
 - 'I like tea with sugar.'
 - 'I don't.'
- To disagree with a negative statement:
 - We use *pronoun + auxiliary/modal verb*:
 - 'I don't like tea with sugar.'
 - 'I do.'

Agreeing & disagreeing in a discussion

- Here are some expressions you can use to agree and disagree. You will need to use these expressions in a discussion.
- Agreeing
 - That's right!
 - Absolutely!
 - Exactly!
 - Me too!
 - Yes, I agree!
 - I totally agree!
 - I couldn't agree more!
 - I see exactly what you mean!
- Disagreeing
 - I don't agree!
 - I totally disagree!
 - Absolutely not!
 - That's not right!
 - I'm not sure about that.
- Partly agreeing
 - I agree to a point, but...
 - I see your point but...
 - That's partly true, but...
 - I see where you're coming from, but...
- It is always a good idea to justify your opinions. Don't just say 'I agree', but say 'I agree because I think that...' (explain your reason).
